Overview of Education Initiatives

Planning for education activities is done in conjunction with community partners, and the types of education provided are a direct result of our community collaborations. CERAH has worked diligently to respond to educational needs by making educational events accessible via videoconference and/or by delivering education in regional communities.

Planning for seniors' mental health and aging is conducted in partnership with the North West Dementia Working Group, the North West Regional Geriatric Education Collaborative, St. Joseph's Care Group, the Regional Behavioural Supports Program and other collaborative initiatives.

Planning for palliative care education is conducted in partnership with the North West Regional Palliative Care Program and the lead agency for the program - St. Joseph's Care Group. CERAH co-leads the Palliative Care Education Collaborative, a working group of the Regional Palliative Care Program made up of individuals and organizations with palliative care education

as part of their mandate. The palliative care for Indigenous community's education emerged from Dr. Kelley's CIHR work and earlier work done at CERAH by Dr. Kelley, Dr. Kortes-Miller, and Holly Prince. The delivery of educational initiatives for Indigenous communities is done in collaboration with Indigenous organizations and communities and government and organization program funders.

Centre Programs

Dementia Café

Dementia Café: A Place to Belong was created as a space to foster and maintain a safe and inclusive social environment with opportunities for social connection and interaction for people with dementia, regardless of age or stage, and their care partners. It is a social program that provides a safe and inclusive environment for social interaction and provides opportunities to decrease social isolation that can occur with a diagnosis of dementia. Specifically, the goals of Dementia Café: A Place to Belong include:

- To create and maintain a safe and inclusive social environment with opportunities for social connection and interaction for people with dementia (regardless of age or stage of dementia) and their care partners
- To engage and involve willing people with early dementia and care partners on the advisory committee and as volunteers with the Dementia Café: A Place to Belong
- To provide resources and information to people with dementia and care partners The Dementia Café continues to be held in-person post-pandemic, and has grown in numbers since.

North West Dementia Working Group

The North West Dementia Working Group (NWDWG) is an independent Northwestern Ontario grassroots advocacy group and has been in existence since 2014. Comprised of people living with dementia and care partners, the group is supported by the CERAH. The mission and vision of the NWDWG is to be a voice for people living with dementia to ensure they are treated with respect, dignity, and afforded their human rights. As a group, they work to challenge stigma and advocate for meaningful inclusion of people living with dementia by promoting awareness, education, and influencing policies and services. Post-pandemic, they have resumed their monthly meetings to be in-person, and the group has since grown to be just over 20 people living with dementia and their care partners.

Taking Control of Our Lives - February 16, 2023 - April 13, 2023

"Taking Control of Our Lives" is an 8- week self-management education program for people living with early dementia. Topics over the eight weeks include:

This program is for people living with dementia. Taking Control of Our Lives is intended to help individuals develop skills, increase confidence and feel empowered to take control of their life by talking with and learning from others that may be experiencing some of the same things that they are.

FINANCIAL REPORT

6.1 Expenditures

The majority of expenditures are on human resources. During 2022-2023, CERAH employed nine core staff on annual contract renewal. The funds for salaries come from education contracts. CERAH also employs research assistants, project assistants and education facilitators staff on a fixed-term basis, depending on the project or research grant.

All office and program delivery expenditures are paid for from external grants and contracts. Accounting is done project by project. Audits are done on MOHLTC and Ontario Health contracts annually. Funding for release time for the CERAH Director's administrative role or funds for key activities such as travel or meeting expenses costs are supported by identified budget line allocation or by overhead generated by grants and contracts.

6.2 Revenues

CERAH receives no operating budget from Lakehead University. The university provides in-kind support in the form of office space, Information Technology services, accounting, human resources and research administration. CERAH highly values this in-kind support. The Director of CERAH is a full-time senior faculty member and is not financially compensated. The Director receives one full course buy-out through non-university revenues of the Centre.

The primary ongoing revenue for CERAH is from the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and Ontario Health, to provide education to health care professionals. These contracts have been ongoing since 1992, and 1997 respectively. Annual services plans are made for each contract, regular financial statements are provided, and annual audits are submitted. All funds are allocated to staff salary and benefits and program expenses. Additionally, CERAH received money from Thunder Bay Medical Society to plan their CME Events. This work concluded in 2023.

Many CERAH staff members are part-time or hired on a fixed-term basis to accommodate additional contracts. Generating income is quite difficult to do as most CERAH contracts are with non-profit organizations or government-funded groups who do not, or cannot, pay any overhead fees.

7. MOVING FORWARD

2022/2023 was a year of movement and growth for our Centre with the return of Centre staff and research affiliates to campus and more in-person educational offerings. It has been

rewarding to watch the CERAH team adapt and thrive within their programs and continue work in an ever-changing environment. Some highlights from this year include: expansion of palliative care education delivery to Indigenous communities in Canada with the addition of communities in British Columbia, and celebrating the 5th Anniversary of the Dementia Café. Also of note is the work and contributions to health equity by Holly Prince, Lead - Indigenous Peoples' Health & Aging division, being honoured with a number of awards including the Denise Brooks Health Equity Champion award and the Inclusion Vanguard Award from the Women's Executive Network. Lakehead University also recognized Dr. Elaine Wiersma, CERAH Associate Director, alongside the North West Dementia Working Group with the Community-Engaged Research Award. This past year the CERAH team also said good-bye to two long-standing staff members, Ruth Wilford and Deb Riddell, who have both retired. They will both be missed and we are grateful for their contributions to our Centre. Personally, I wish to give Dr. Ide Costa a shout out and much gratitude for taking on the role of Acting Director while I was on sabbatical.

I'm confident that our Centre will continue to grow and thrive due to the continued hard work and efforts of our dedicated staff, research affiliates and students. I look forward to another successful year ahead.
