## 2. EDUCATIONAL INITIATIVES (APRIL 1, 2024 - MARCH 31, 2025)

#### 2.1 Education Contracts

Since 1993, CERAH has organized and delivered gerontology education related to aging, seniors' mental health, palliative care, and other aging-related issues. Annual funding from the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-term Care (MOHLTC) and the North West Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) (now Ontario Health) has been allocated to CERAH since the 1990s as base funding, meaning that while funding contracts are annual, CERAH does not need to reapply for this funding.

In addition to this annual funding, in 2024-2025, CERAH received additional base funding from Ontario Health for two programs - Community Behavioural Supports funding and Dementia Café. An ongoing agreement also continues with St. Joseph's Care Group to organize and facilitate education for the Regional Behavioural Supports Program.

#### One-Time Special Project Funding

In terms of special project funding, 2024-2025 saw contracts from Indigenous Services Canada's Ontario Region and Ontario Health to deliver palliative care education to frontline health and social care providers working in Indigenous communities. A contract was also secured from the Kenora Chiefs Advisory to provide palliative care education to First Nations in Treaty #3. CERAH also completed an education service agreement with the Thunder Bay Regional Health Sciences Centre (TBRHSC) to provide palliative care educational services to staff, as well as with the North West Regional Palliative Care Program, St. Joseph's Care Group.

# 2.2 Overview of Education Initiatives

(Education Service Agreement)

CERAH works diligently to respond to educational needs by making educational events accessible via videoconference and/or by delivering education in regional communities. Planning for education activities is done in conjunction with community partners, and the types of education provided are a direct result of our community collaborations.

Planning for seniors' mental health and aging is conducted in partnership with the North West Dementia Working Group, the North West Regional Geriatric Education Collaborative, St. Joseph's Care Group, the Regional Behavioural Supports Program and other collaborative initiatives.

Planning for palliative care education is conducted in partnership with the North West Regional Palliative Care Program and the lead agency for the program - St. Joseph's Care Group. CERAH co-leads the Palliative Care Education Collaborative, a working group of the Regional Palliative Care Program comprising individuals and organizations with palliative care education as part of their mandate.

The Indigenous Peoples' Health & Aging division responds to community needs by developing, implementing, and evaluating curricula and resources through culturally and contextually relevant research and knowledge translation. The planning is led by Anishinaabe scholar Dr. Holly Prince, in collaboration with Indigenous Elders and Knowledge Carriers, Indigenous organizations and communities, and government and organizational program funders.

#### Centre Programs

#### **Dementia Café**

Dementia Café: A Place to Belong was created as a space to foster and maintain a safe and inclusive social environment with opportunities for social connection and interaction for people with dementia, regardless of age or stage, and their care partners. It is a social program that provides a safe and inclusive environment for social interaction and provides opportunities to decrease social isolation that can occur with a diagnosis of dementia. Specifically, the goals of Dementia Café: A Place to Belong include:

- To create and maintain a safe and inclusive social environment with opportunities for social connection and interaction for people with dementia (regardless of age or stage of dementia) and their care partners
- To engage and involve willing people with early dementia and care partners on the advisory committee and as volunteers with the Dementia Café: A Place to Belong
- To provide resources and information to people with dementia and care partners

The Dementia Café continues to be held in person post-pandemic (three times per month) and has grown in numbers since. The Dementia Café ran 34 times over the 2024 - 2025 period.

## **Rural Dementia Café**

The Rural Dementia Café is a new initiative launching in April 2025 in Kakabeka Falls, through a partnership between NorWest Community Health Centres, the Centre for Education and Research on Aging & Health (CERAH), and with support from the Alzheimer's Society Thunder Bay (ASTB). It is designed to provide a welcoming and supportive space for individuals living with dementia or memory challenges, as well as their care partners, family members, and friends. Open to all and free of charge, the Café offers engaging activities such as music, games, and arts in a relaxed environment to reduce isolation and foster connection.

The goals of the Rural Dementia Café include:

- Fostering community connection and emotional support for people affected by dementia in rural areas
- Offering monthly interactive activities to promote well-being and engagement
- Supporting caregivers through peer networks and access to resources
- Enhancing communication and understanding between caregivers and individuals living with dementia
- Sharing best practices across regional agencies to improve dementia support

The Rural Dementia Cafe will be held on the fourth Friday of the month, starting from April 2025, at the Rural 60 Plus in Kakabeka Falls. This new program is a vital step toward enhancing rural dementia care and building community-based support systems.

## **North West Dementia Working Group**

The North West Dementia Working Group (NWDWG) is an independent Northwestern Ontario grassroots advocacy group and has been in existence since 2014. Comprised of people living with dementia and care partners, the group is supported by CERAH. The mission and vision of the NWDWG is to be a voice for people living with dementia to ensure they are treated with respect and dignity and afforded their human rights. As a group, they work to challenge stigma and advocate for meaningful inclusion of people living with dementia by promoting awareness, education, and influencing policies and services. Post-pandemic, they have resumed their monthly meetings to be in-person, and the group has since grown to be just over 20 people living with dementia and their care partners. In 2024, the NWDWG celebrated their 10th anniversary.

During the 2024-2025 period, the NWDWG held 10 meetings, one per month, each lasting 2.5 hours.

#### **Dementia Gardens: A Place to Grow**

Dementia Gardens: A Place to Grow is the North West Dementia Working Group's (NWDWG) newest initiative—an innovative and inclusive project designed to support individuals living with dementia through meaningful engagement with nature. Rooted in the Green Care Farm model, this initiative offers a dignified outdoor day program, community and family events, and intergenerational activities, all centred around native plant gardens. In December 2024, the project was relocated to the Centennial Conservatory, where it will officially launch in Spring 2025 as a collaborative partnership between the City of Thunder Bay, Lakehead University, and NWDWG.

A planning committee composed of people with lived experience of dementia, care partners, native plant experts, and community members—supported by CERAH staff—continues to shape the program with care and vision. The project has received approval from university leadership. It is now focused on implementation, with risk management planning, staffing considerations (including an on-site health professional, funding permitting), and program development well underway.

Goals of Dementia Gardens

- Empower people living with dementia through purposeful, hands-on activity
- Provide caregiver respite and support
- Create opportunities for sensory engagement and learning about native ecosystems
- Foster meaningful relationships among participants and with the natural world
- Encourage environmental stewardship through biodiversity and pollinator support
- Deliver safe, structured, and enjoyable outdoor programming

The program will run weekly from May to September 2025, and future plans include developing a native plant nursery to sustain the gardens and support local biodiversity.

#### **Dementia in the Outdoors**

Dementia in the Outdoors: Exploring the Mechanisms of Engagement is a multi-site, participatory research project led by CERAH in partnership with the University of British Columbia and the University of the Fraser Valley. The study aims to understand how nature-based outdoor innovations—such as gardening programs, outdoor clubs, and trishaw rides—benefit people living with dementia, and how these programs support social, relational, and environmental citizenship.

Using a qualitative case study approach guided by the Consolidated Framework for Implementation Research (CFIR), the project examines three case study sites:

- Dementia Gardens: A Place to Grow (Thunder Bay, ON)
- Fireweed Club (Vancouver, BC)
- Trishaw Rides Program (Chilliwack, BC)

The research engages people with dementia, care partners, students, and community partners as active collaborators, documenting both experiences and the processes that make these innovations successful. Findings will inform the development of guidelines and resources for implementing effective and meaningful nature-based programs for people with dementia.

During the 2024–2027 period, the project will involve interviews, focus groups, participant observation, and visual/arts-based methods, with iterative participatory data analysis to ensure authentic representation of people with dementia's voices.

#### 6. FINANCIAL REPORT

#### **6.1 Expenditures**

The majority of expenditures are on human resources. During 2024-2025, CERAH employed ten core staff on annual contract renewal. The funds for salaries come from education contracts. CERAH also employs research assistants, project assistants and education facilitators on a fixed-term basis, depending on the project or research grant.

External grants and contracts fund all office and program delivery expenditures. Accounting is done project by project. Audits are conducted annually on MOHLTC and Ontario Health contracts. Funding for release time for the CERAH Director's administrative role, as well as funds for key activities such as travel and meeting expenses, is supported by an identified budget line allocation or by overhead generated from grants and contracts.

#### 6.2 Revenues

CERAH receives no operating budget from Lakehead University. The university provides in-kind support in the form of office space, Information Technology services, accounting, human resources and research administration. CERAH highly values this in-kind support. The Director of CERAH is a full-time senior faculty member and is not financially compensated for this role. The Director receives one full course buy-out through non-university revenues of the Centre.

The primary ongoing revenue for CERAH is from the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and Ontario Health, which provides funding to support education for healthcare professionals. These contracts have been in effect since 1992 and 1997, respectively. Annual service plans are made for each contract, regular financial statements are provided, and annual audits are submitted. All funds are allocated to staff salaries and benefits, as well as program expenses.

Many CERAH staff members are part-time or hired on a fixed-term basis to accommodate additional contracts. Generating income can be quite challenging, as most CERAH contracts are with non-profit organizations or government-funded groups that do not, or cannot, pay any overhead fees.

## **Moving forward:**

As we look ahead, CERAH continues to build momentum in advancing education, research, and collaboration across Northwestern Ontario and beyond. This year, we were pleased to welcome three new team members: Jiaqi Li, Research Coordinator; Trisha Wilson, Dementia and Seniors' Mental Health Knowledge Broker; and Marcie Hampson, Knowledge Broker Assistant. Their expertise and dedication strengthen our capacity to conduct research and deliver meaningful education.

We are especially excited to be preparing for our inaugural CERAH Conference. This year, the theme will be *Aging Across the Life Cycle*. This event will be a national gathering that brings together all four of our divisions: Aging in Place, Indigenous Peoples' Health & Aging, Palliative Care, and Dementia & Seniors' Mental Health. This flagship event will welcome over 300 participants from across Canada, creating a unique space for knowledge exchange, collaboration, and innovation in aging and health.

With the continued efforts of our staff, research affiliates, and students, CERAH is well-positioned to grow its impact both regionally and nationally. We look forward to building on our successes and working together to advance health equity, improve access to care, and support healthy aging across the life cycle.
